The interdisciplinary research group “Was ist der Mensch? Kultur – Sprache – Natur” and the associated graduates’ program are a joint project of the University of Dortmund and the Institute for Advanced Study in the Humanities (Kulturwissenschaftliches Institut, Essen, Forschungskolleg der Universitäten Bochum, Dortmund, Duisburg-Essen). Through its annual conference the research group seeks to provide a platform for re-thinking basic aspects of humans’ nature and to encourage work on a new, integrated conception of what it means to be human.

The Conference

This year’s symposium will present research on human development, language acquisition and social interaction and will explore its import for an understanding of humans’ nature. While it is generally agreed that the social and cultural dimensions of human interaction are distinctive, the exact character of human interaction, its basic processes and component abilities are the subject of debate.

- Which abilities make human social interaction distinctive?
- Do humans possess a species-unique adaptation for social interaction?
- What role does the human capacity for language play?
- What do studies of acquisition reveal about human abilities?
- Which factors influence human interaction over the life span?

The symposium aims to examine current research on these questions and to discuss its implications for the question of what makes us uniquely human.
